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## REGISTRATION INFORMATION

### Adding and Dropping Courses

Students wishing to add or drop a course may begin the process by picking up the proper form at the University Registrar's Office. Any student with financial assistance who wishes to change from full- to part-time status must contact the Financial Assistance Office. After the deadline to add classes has passed, there will be a \$5.00 late fee for a student to officially register for a class he/she has been attending.

For certain courses which run for only 7-10 weeks instead of a full semester, the following time periods will apply for adding/dropping:

Last day to add: same as for all other courses

Last day to drop without record: end of the 2nd week of the course

Last day to drop with a "W": end of 7th week of 10-week courses; end of 5th week of 7-week courses

*A student will receive a grade for each course not officially dropped, whether or not the student attended the course through the end of the semester.*

Students may return registration materials **after** the assigned time, but not before.

Seniors and other select groups of students may register through CampusWeb. These students will receive specific instructions with their registration materials.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### **Pass/Fail Grade Option**

Juniors and seniors may choose a pass/fail grading option for elective courses not needed to satisfy major, minor or Global Village requirements. Such choices must be made in writing at the University Registrar's Office by the end of the fourth week of classes (September 22, 2008 for fall semester and January 30, 2009 for spring semester). Reversal of the request may be made up until the same deadline.

Under this option, a Pass grade will be entered on the student's academic record if the instructor submits a grade of C- or above. If the grade submitted is below a C-, the grade submitted will be entered on the academic record.

### **Change of Major/Minor**

Any student wishing to change a major or minor should pick up a form in the University Registrar's Office to be filled out in conjunction with the appropriate department heads. Students are encouraged to contact the University Registrar's Office during the first semester they decide to make a change of major/minor. If there is a change in major or minor curriculum requirements, students will be expected to complete the requirements that are in effect at the time the major/minor is officially declared.

### **Student Classification**

A student's classification is determined by the number of semester hours accumulated by the beginning of the semester. Classification is as follows:

Sophomore:	24 - 55
Junior:	56 - 89

### **Graduate Credit to Apply Toward Undergraduate Degree**

Junior or senior students may, upon recommendation by their advisor and with approval from the graduate program involved, enroll in a graduate course and receive graduate credit for the purpose of "transferring" the credit to their undergraduate program to meet degree requirements. The student charge, if full-time without the graduate or seminary course and within 18 semester hours, is at the undergraduate rate. If the student is part-time without the graduate or seminary course, or if the course creates an overload (over 18 semester hours), the charge is at the graduate or seminary rate.

### **Withdrawal from the University**

A student considering withdrawal from the university is asked to counsel with the academic advisor and the Vice President for Student Life. Forms to begin the process may be picked up from the Student Life Office, located in the University Commons.

**FINAL EXAM SCHEDULE**

Exams are scheduled for two hours and are given in regularly scheduled classrooms.

Instructors of courses with multiple sections may choose to give the final examination for all sections together during one evening of final exam week. Students are responsible to consult syllabi to determine whether their exam times differ from the schedule printed below.

Final Exams out of Schedule:

Final exams must be taken as scheduled except when unable due to illness or death in the immediate family. Students who have more than two exams per day may request to take a final examination out of schedule. Such requests must be made by the Friday before final exam week.

If a student wishes to take an examination out of schedule for any other reason, a \$35 fee must be paid, upon approval by the instructor and by the Undergraduate Academic Dean's Office.

All requests to take a final examination out of schedule must be made by filling out a form available in the Undergraduate Academic Dean's Office.

## ANNUAL NOTIFICATION TO STUDENTS REGARDING FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. They are:

1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access.

Students should submit to the registrar a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The registrar will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the Registrar's Office, the registrar shall advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed.

2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate or misleading.

Students may ask the University to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.

If the University decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the University will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, academic, research, or support staff position; a person or company with whom the University has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, or collection agent); a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Eastern Mennonite University to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:

### DEFINITION OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Eastern Mennonite University's current definition of DIRECTORY INFORMATION is listed below in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 as Amended. Should you wish not to have this information released, you must file a formal request in writing with the University Registrar.

DIRECTORY INFORMATION may be unconditionally released to the public without the consent of the student, unless he/she has specifically asked that prior consent be obtained before releasing such information. DIRECTORY INFORMATION includes:

- a student's name
- enrollment status (full-time or part-time)
- address and telephone listing (permanent, local, or residence hall)
- date of birth
- major and minor field(s) of study
- participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- weight and height of members of athletic teams
- dates of attendance
- degrees, awards, and honors (including Dean's List and graduation honors) received
- the most recent previous educational institution attended by the student
- student level (first-year, sophomore, etc.)
- degree sought and anticipated graduation date
- photograph
- e-mail address

Students will be notified each year by the University Registrar's Office as to what is considered DIRECTORY INFORMATION. A full statement of student rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act may be found on page 6 of this Schedule.

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### VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS

Federal legislation requires colleges and universities to make voter registration forms available to degree-seeking students studying on their campuses. Accordingly, a supply of voter registration forms is available at the University Registrar's Office.

While students who are a citizen of any state may use this form to register to vote in their home state, **persons who are not U.S. citizens must not submit this form – doing so may cause serious difficulties with visa status.**

EMU is providing these forms in compliance with federal stipulations, but recognizes the responsibility of each student to decide whether to register to vote. Students who do wish to register should keep in mind that individual states' deadlines to register to vote may be up to 30 days in advance of election day, and should submit their registration forms in time to meet these deadlines.
